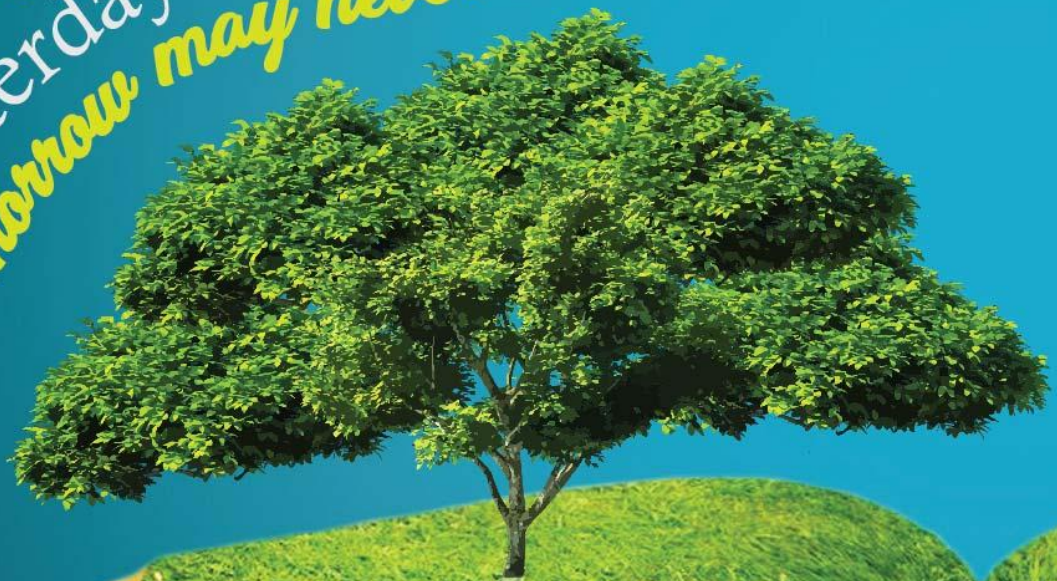

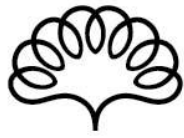
We also record our thanks and appreciation to Mr Lawrence Lee who recently completed his contract as Club General Manager and wish him well in his future undertakings.

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

When we ran for the General Committee positions during the last AGM, we said we would operate the Club according to these principals. The 'Principals' are the ones listed below.

1. The first order of business was not to lose money.
2. The second order of business was to make this Club your second home.
3. The third order of business was to preserve and enhance the value of your membership and equity in the Club.

We also promised to communicate better with the members and in a more transparent way. It's been 6 months since the AGM and we have this to report:

1. About Not Losing Money

- We immediately renovated the Games Room and the new Games Room opened on 1st January, 2017. The noticeable result was that some members who had migrated to outside Games Rooms came back and patronised the Club. We can safely say that gaming income will be much higher in 2017.
- The House and Grounds has been busy lowering electricity and water consumption by installing more efficient air-conditioning packages, LED lighting and by proper scheduling and plugging leaks. As a result electricity has fallen from RM 65,000 in 2015 to RM 55,000 per month at the end of 2016. Our January 2017 electricity bill came to RM 47,000. You may be surprised to know that electricity consumption was 1,900,000 kWhr in 2005 and this year it will be 1,200,000 kWhr.
- F&B has been a money loser for the last few years. The GC has been looking into many ways to stem the loss and at the same time provide good food to the members. The kitchen will be renovated soon. We made a little money from F&B in January and hope that will continue. Have an idea. Let us know.
- There has been some minor attrition in all departments and we try to make do with the balance.
- All in our accounts in January 2017 showed a positive RM 15,857.

2. Your Second Home

- If all we wanted to do was to save cost, we might as well stay at home and watch TV or talk to our wife or husband.
- Dinner events have been extremely popular with the members. New Year's Party was a smashing success and CNY Shanghai night was sold out. MIN nights have been great fun and MIN food is served warm now.
- Our GC Hennie Coenraad gave a well-attended lecture on how to prepare turkey dishes.
- Family Day was well attended. We are going to hold factory visits for children and events where members can come with 3 generations of his family.
- Take a look at the reciprocal clubs. The new ones added in 2016 were Jaisal Club Ltd., Rajasthan, India, Embassy Club, Shanghai, China, Terminal City Club, Canada and The New Club, Taiping, Perak. Clubbing is about social relationships and this grows more important as we grow older.
- Come to the bar. You find the friendliest members there. One elderly member wanted to give his membership to his son, but after making some new friends at the bar, decided to keep the membership.
- Take up swimming. Our swimming coach, Jui, can teach a 70 year old person to swim butterfly.
- We are upgrading our Karaoke system to include more songs. The children's library has been moved downstairs so that all children's activities can be easily monitored by one parent.

3. Enhance the Value of your Membership and of your Equity in the Club

- Sale of membership from the Club is FROZEN for all categories, including second generation.
- Third party sales are still being transacted and we heard that one new potential member paid RM 26,500.
- Members are put on notice that if your membership is terminated for whatever reason, you will not be able to reinstate it by paying a fee. Reinstatement is not a right. Only the GC can make an exception in extremely rare circumstances.

4. Communication with Members

We are thinking of holding "MEET THE GC" sessions monthly just before the GC Monthly Meeting.

In this issue of Samanea, I have asked Mr Bruce Chan, a former Club President to detail the changes in membership prices and the underlying reasons and where the price may go. I believe this makes good reading for most members.

I have also asked some members to state their case for selling the Club or their case for not selling the Club. Most of us can identify with these reasons. There is no absolute right or wrong, just our personal circumstance that makes the difference.

In the end a solution needs to be found to please most members and to console those who don't get what they want.

5. Is this an Old Person's Club

If you look at the "A" members' age profile, yes, we look pretty old. If you include in the profile, members' wives and children, you will be surprised that we are not old at all. We look quite young. This was highlighted in the 2015 Annual Report.

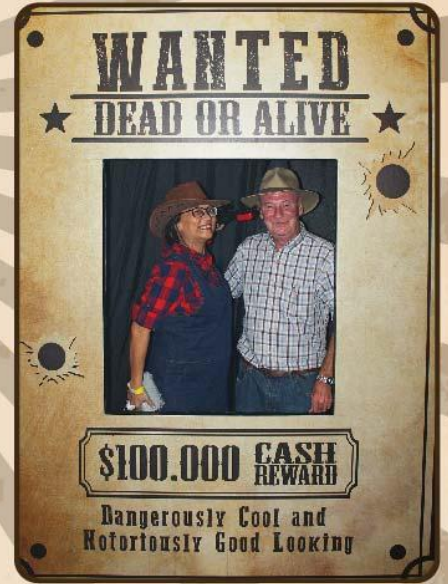

The iconic Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur is very dear to my heart as I am the second generation that grew up at this beautiful place. My parents joined this club when we moved to Desa Pandan as it provided both a sanctuary and an outlet for me and my brother to explore, enjoy and grow to love. As us kids grew older of course, we naturally wandered off into a different phase of our lives by studying overseas, busy getting a job, socializing etc...however Raintree Club was always there deep in my heart

My parents transferred their membership to my name after knowing that my family will be expanding and they, alike me, wanted a family themed venue suitable for my next generation to grow up in. like a sudden heart attack, an article popped up in the newspapers stating that there is a proposal for Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur to be sold!!!

Shocked and alarmed, myself, my brother, my cousin and our uncle all attended the AGM with our hope held high to cast our votes to retain a part of the heritage. It was utterly disappointing to be seated amongst other tenured members who held on to their chance to voice out their opinion over the microphone, stating generic reasons as follows:

- Our children is now grown up and we no longer visit the club often, so why do we have to keep paying for the membership when the facilities aren't even being used?
- The club is very dated and worn out, hence it's not attracting the younger folks
- Other clubs are offering better facilities

The Raintree is also an exclusive club. The number of full Members is limited to 2,000 by the Club's own Constitution.

In that moment, I felt the urge to voice out my thoughts that all such negative thoughts need to have a fresh voice. I brought my 5 month old infant to the meeting as I needed to let everyone know from my point of view, as the new generation, seeking not superficial gains, but to retain a sanctuary in which my kids is able to grow up and be safe and enjoy the facilities offered. I humbly appeal to members to kindly please consider the following:

- If you are not frequenting the club often anymore, then please sell your membership to other who would appreciate what Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur have to offer to their families instead
 - Don't focus on the monetary gains, as money will ALWAYS run out, but losing a piece of treasure, you will never be able to gain it back
 - For the amount of membership fee being charged by Raintree Club, no other clubs in Kuala Lumpur vicinity is able to offer, especially in such a convenient location.
 - Let's focus not on selling and getting a few bucks into your pocket, lets focus instead in being creative on how the facilities to the club can be improved

Most importantly, to all dear fellow Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur members out there...you and your loved ones have had the chance to experience what Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur have to offer. The memories, the smiles, the laughers, the scrapes, the scars, the good and the bad....now it is time for you to let the new generation have a chance to experience the same.

I would like to save the Raintree Club of Kuala Lumpur not only because I myself grew up here within it's enclosure.....but I would love for my children to be able to experience the same and pass the membership down to the next generation.

Kuala Lumpur in 1980 was like an old rustic building with peeling paint, badly in need of repairs and rejuvenation to take on the challenges of a modern city. Old majestic buildings torn down to make way for the new gleaming towers, green fields were ploughed to accommodate growing townships and congested roads were made more chaotic as vehicles and construction equipment struggle for right of way as roads were dug and widened. Tower cranes climbed skywards at every corner of the city, swinging and lifting their heavy loads to feed the construction frenzy.

Against that backdrop, the Raintree Club drew its life and form. There was that feel good spirit amongst city folks, businesses were thriving and jobs were plentiful. In 1982, when Allied Capital launched the sale of memberships of Raintree Club, early birds cautiously signed up, placing their faith on a blueprint and the promise of "an invitation to the good life". More joined when construction of the Raintree Club began.

When the club had its grand opening in 1985, it did not disappoint. It was truly an outstandingly attractive building with refined wood paneled interior and the finest architectural finish. The sports centre was (and still is) the talk of the town with indoor tennis courts that till today is unmatched by other clubs in Klang Valley.

The food and beverage facilities and service added the icing to the Club's tagline "an invitation to the good life". It was as good as you can get with fine dining in the Lilasari and good coffee house food in the Kenanga. There was an atmosphere of conviviality and indulgence.

From an initial offering price of RM12,000 offering in the early 80s, where the prospective members had only a blueprint to hang their faith on, the price rose to RM18,000 when the clubhouse took shape in an enclave in Ampang amidst the shaded old bungalows and embassies.

Once the club began its operation, more were attracted to join. Allied Capital continue to sell the membership but at a higher prices (the highest was probably around RM25,000). In the initial years, the club was run by appointees of Allied Capital. The proceeds of the membership sales went to Allied Capital.

The euphoria quickly settled as members took on governing of the club. With involvement of members in the General Committee, the weight of fiduciary responsibilities came to bear. Allied Capital wanted to continue selling memberships up to the maximum number (2200 members is the maximum allowed in the constitution, and slightly less than 2000 were sold) allowed for in the Club Constitution. The members questioned the rights of Allied Capital to sell and profit from the sales of memberships. An acrimonious battle began which ended in the courts. Meantime membership sales from Allied Capital were frozen. The demand for membership continued unabated, and memberships were traded privately with transactions reached dizzying heights of RM40,000. Many were unaware of the ongoing legal issues with Allied Capital at that time.

In 1987, with looming recession, the demand for memberships slackened. Many memberships went into default and in the early 90s, one of the early attempts to reduce the growing number of defaulted memberships was to invite for tender of membership at a reserve price of RM12,000.

In the 90s, many became aware of the litigation between Raintree and Allied Capital. It was a frustrating legal battle that swung between victory and defeat, moving from one court to the next higher court. Every year, there was no definitive outcome to report to the members and millions were spent in legal fees. On top of that, the club faced financial woes. These issues did a lot of damage to the reputation and image of the club. The club stock of defaulted memberships continued to rise. Attempts to sell the memberships at RM12,000 were unfavourable. Open market sales were transacted at prices as low as RM6,000 from 1995 onwards. Many Club memberships were advertised for sale in the Malay Mail. The club maintained the selling price at RM12,000, but the stock of terminated memberships grew.

To mitigate the problem, the Club offered 2nd generation and siblings memberships at prices that competed aggressively with the open market transactions. Over a few years, the terminated memberships stock dropped by almost half.



The club finally won a last appeal against Allied Capital which was wound up. The club filed for cost and claim against the various defendants. Sadly the club was blindsided when it received a court filing, from the receiver of Allied Capital, to hear a claim, that had been held in abeyance, against Raintree Club. (This article will not attempt to discuss the legalese of the litigation with any authority). The case before the Club concerned issues of claims from Allied Capital, related to the construction of the Club, that relied on documents dating back to 1985. The court instructed the Club and Allied Capital to mediate, and both agreed to a settlement where each party withdrew all claims from the other party.

Members were freed from the fear of their personal liability in the law suits. The Club's AGM reports were finally cleared of any reference to legal proceedings with Allied Capital, which had dogged its pages for more than 2 decades.

Those dedicated Club Officers who had worked hard to fight the legal issues protecting the Club interests should be acknowledged at this juncture. Member who now talk aggressively about selling the Club should thank the Club officers who have taken on this battle to free the Club of all encumbrances.

In recent years, the demand for memberships is rising. The Club increased membership pricing from RM9,000 in 2015 to RM12,000 at the beginning of 2016.

Together with increased membership price, the Club thought it prudent to relook the monthly membership fee that has not seen an increase since 1992. This precipitated a chain of events leading to a resolution to look into selling the club. The resolution was passed. To protect the value of members' equity in the Club the GC put a hold on the sale of membership.

Membership is still being transacted in the open market. A recent applicant intimated he paid more than RM20,000 in a private transaction. Would membership prices reach the dizzying heights of the 1986? It's any body guess.

Why I Want to Sell the Club's Property

There are three compelling reasons why the Club's property should be sold:

One is the limited membership and the poor patronage of the club make it unsustainable to operate the club without periodically seeking for increased subscriptions which will burden the club's members especially the retirees who seldom patronage the club to finance the club's operations. The fact that the club only has food outlet itself indicate the poor patronage. If one visits a well patronage club like the lake club you will notice that at all times throngs of members patronage its food outlets of which there are five. Even with one outlet the Raintree Club has barely many members patronising it. Also with limited membership subscription because of the small number of members how can the club sustain itself especially with increasing cost of operating the club how is possible for the club to generate sufficient revenue to finance its operating cost. The fact the club has to adopt this compulsory spending to force members to patronage the club is itself indicate the lack of patronage.



The other reason is that substantial development around the club has fortunately led to a substantially high price for property in that area which offers a tremendous opportunity for the club to dispose of its property which will benefit members. Bear in mind when the club was first mooted it was touted to be a good investment as the price of the club membership will go up .

Unfortunately over the years the value of the club membership has not only not maintained its price but dropped substantially. To make it worst for the members the club management has made the transfer fee so exorbitantly high so much it has made the club membership value almost valueless. Again the high transfer fee made one wonders whether it is again an avenue to generate income for the club to sustain its operating cost. With the high value offered in disposing of the property members could at least realised a good value for its investment in the club and use it to apply for membership in another club with better patronage

Finally a substantial number of members are in the retiring age and has no income as indicated by the large number of them turning out at the AGM to vote for the resolution to sell the club's property. These retirees do not patronage and use the club's facilities and it would be grossly unfair to them to continue to pay the monthly subscription especially when it keeps on increasing. This is made worst when they have to incur the compulsory spending. Selling the club's property and dispersing the net proceeds will give them an opportunity to opt out and relief them of this monthly expenses which they can ill afford it with no means of generating an income. The fact that a large number turned out at the AGM to vote for resolution shows how desperate they are in getting an opportunity to opt out of this predicament.

Members who want to retain the club's property and use the club's facilities will not lose out if the property is sold as they too will benefit by getting a good price for their club membership which they can use to join another club. So in selling the club's property every member will benefit

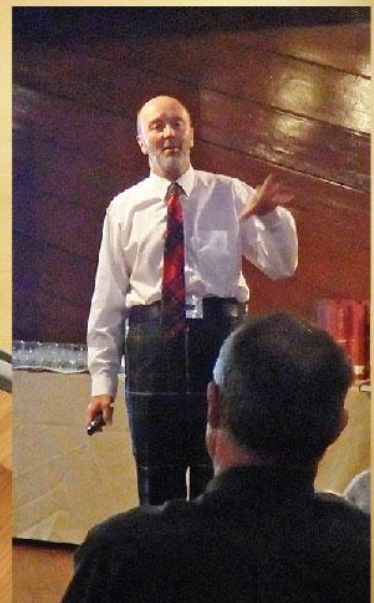

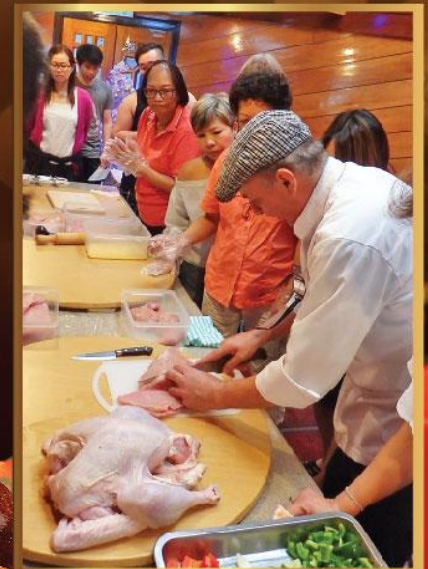
